EDITORIAL

n early 2017 Cherry Gardens is scheduled to get connected to the National Broadband Network but unlike most of Australia NBN Co has decided to install a Fixed Wireless network instead of the Fibre and copper network.

NBN Co has applied to the Onkaparinga council to erect a 40 metre tower to deliver the wireless broadband. They have proposed that the Tower be erected on the Blackwood Golf Course land near the boundary fence to the Recreation Ground and in close proximity to the kid's playground, netball/tennis courts and clubrooms.

While we are very keen to be connected to the National Broadband Network we were a little concerned as to the location of the proposed Tower. Some research led us to have concerns as to the safety of the wireless system especially as it was so close to the Recreation Ground and the facilities there, where a lot of people gather in large numbers, particularly kid's. We also looked into the effectiveness of the Fixed Wireless network and realised that this method of delivery would dis-advantage all residents who do not have a "line of sight" to the Tower. This would essentially mean that if you live in a gully or on the low side of the road then it is unlikely you would be able to get a connection without erecting a tall receiving tower on your house.

We are still unsure why our district cannot get the fibre and copper connection to the NBN however we assume it is because of the number of households in Cherry Gardens.

Anyway we discussed the issue with

the Recreation Ground and the 4 sporting clubs and decided that on behalf of the community we would object to the development application on the basis that there had been a complete lack of community consultation, information sharing

by NBN Co and the location that they had chosen, we believed was unsatisfactory.

If anyone in the district has any comments or has some expertise in regards to the NBN options then we would be happy to hear from you. If the council upholds our objection then we hope we can arrange a public meeting where NBN Co can provide the community with information on this Fixed Wireless service, how they can ensure that all residents will be able to access reliable and fast broadband and allay our concerns on the safety of the wireless signal which the World Health Organisation has declared to be a Class 2b carcinogen.

GEORGE'S GARDENING SUGGESTIONS

Start to think about planting roses and deciduous trees - decide on which ones you want now as it will give you time to source the varieties you desire and also prepare your site (dig a good sized hole and add some compost or well-rotted manure as soon as possible). Prune deciduous trees from the end of the month onwards.

New season strawberry runners can go in now along with leafy vegetables.

Pansies, viola and linaria are great for a splash of colour.

OVER THE STABLE DOOR

Greetings Fellow equines and Horse Owners!

You may have noticed that many of my main topics concern either land management or safety. Once you become a horse owner, you also become in a way a custodian of the environment. Having this large animal in close proximity to your home will often make you more aware of the impact this creature has on your small or even not so small area of land. It is the interests of both yourself, your horse and your acreage that you arm yourself with as much knowledge as possible to improve and maintain the quality of your animal's environment. Throughout the seasons I often mention things which are useful or appropriate to do re care of your equine or your property.

Where safety is concerned, there are always factors to take into consideration when working with your horse/s both on the ground and under saddle. One area I would like to revisit this month concerns riding along trails and/or public thoroughfares. In the past I have mentioned courtesy to other road/trail users etc., but there are other codes of conduct involving our fellow riders when on a trail.

When going out in a group, the ability of the various riders must be taken into consideration. The speed of the group must be kept to the lowest common denominator. This means that if there is a rider capable of only going at a walk, then that sets the pace for all the other riders. One way around this is to split the group into a 'fast' ride and 'slow' ride. The fast group should ensure that they are a good way ahead before they put on the speed,



for risk of upsetting the horses behind. Horses being a herd animal, will be wanting to keep together, so all caution must be taken. Sometimes just the sound of the quicker hoofbeats can be enough to set the other horses off. The rider/s with lesser ability should be kept in the middle of the group, not pushed up the front nor left too far behind. If need be, a more experienced rider can have the one with less experience on a lead rein. The more experienced rider rides closest to the traffic. Try to plan in advance who will be the lead rider and who will bring up the tail. Know who has a mobile phone (if not

all of you!). If anyone is a First Aider, then that should be known too. When traffic is about, everyone will know who goes to the front, who goes to the back and who goes in the middle. When encountering other riders on a trail, slow down and allow room for passing.

If catching up with another group, call out to signal your approach and again slow to a walk for passing. These common courtesy procedures are also relevant to other trail users, such as walkers and bike riders. Some other things to consider before venturing out include fitness and previous experiences of both horse and rider. So an introductory ride for a young horse or inexperienced rider should not be for more than an hour. The type of terrain to be covered also needs to be considered. Is the horse shod, unshod or wearing boots? Weather also plays a part. Many horses are unsettled in windy conditions (they pick up much more than we can hear), so this is not ideal for the green rider. Riding in stormy weather is best to be avoided and extreme heat can be a problem for some riders and horses. These are just a few tips to consider before you leave the front gate! The better prepared you can be, the safer and more enjoyable your ride will be enjoyed!

a Fire Blanket and Dry Powder Fire Extinguisher near the kitchen where many structure fires start? I say near, because they both need to be close by but located away from the potential sources of fire, which are hotplates and ovens in general. Most of us, during our lifetimes, will have experienced the sheer terror of an oven on fire or a fat fire on the hotplates. **NEVER** use water on this type of fire and call 000 for assistance **ASAP**.

I am aware that the subject of the road speed through our beautiful township has been raised before, however, I have recently received a letter from the Minister for Road Safety (Hon Peter Malinauskas MLC), via Nat Cook MP, informing me that the matter has been raised once more with the local council through Mayor Rosenberg. Editors note:

As readers will be aware, there have been a number of discussions previously in regards to speed limits throughout the district. In particular this has related to the more "built up" areas and where there is more perceived risk due to larger numbers of people being around, such as near the Recreation ground and golf course.

The 60km speed limit that exists from the boundary of the golf course through to Acklands Hill road was put in place a few years ago due to the assessment then by the department of Road Transport. We have asked several times for a change to be made to the speed

limit along Ackland Hill road as you approach the Recreation ground entrance due to the increased traffic that exists there, especially during winter with football and netball. This request has been rejected each time. The proposal above is essentially requesting a reduction in the speed limit from 80km/h to 60km/h from the CFS fire-shed through to the start of the 60km/h near the golf course. This would see a speed limit reduction through the more populated area of Cherry Gardens.

How do you store your eggs?

There are conflicting thoughts on how is the best way to store eggs. Refrigerate or not! I always thought it best to refrigerate but others have told me that eggs should be stored at room temperature.

So I went looking for information and was fortunate to find that the CSIRO has just published their findings. Eggs are similar to other protein foods such as meat, fish and poultry, in that they may be contaminated with microbes which can, if allowed to grow, cause food poisoning. Although Salmonella is easy to destroy in cooking (any food cooked uniformly to a temperature of 72 °C will be free of Salmonella), poorly handled eggs have caused many documented outbreaks. This is often the result of consuming eggs raw or only lightly cooked.

If you look closely at an egg shell held against a bright light in a dark room you will be able to see an air gap, usually at the blunt end of the egg. In a fresh egg this air cell is quite small but as the egg ages, water is lost from the 17 000 pores in the egg shell and the air cell gets larger. Also you can see a large moving shadow in the egg which is the yolk floating about in the white.

In fresh eggs the yolk is small and in the centre of the egg. If you hard boil an old egg, you can quite clearly see the air cell indentation in the top of the egg, you can also identify if the yolk has moved off centre by cutting a hard-boiled egg lengthways.

- A quick test for freshness is to check if the raw egg in the shell sinks in a basin of water. Fresh eggs stay at the bottom while stale eggs stand on end or float because of the large air cell.
- Good quality, fresh eggs display certain characteristics when broken out.
 The yolk is small and rounded and stands high in a thick, gel-like egg white which tends to stay compact rather than spread out over a wide



 As eggs age, the yolk becomes larger and flatter, until it eventually breaks.
 The thick egg white becomes thin and runny. By this time the egg will also have developed a stale odour and flavour.

So to storage. The easiest way to maintain eggs at high quality is to store them in cartons in the refrigerator as soon as possible after they are laid. Clean eggs, free of visible defects of the shell and contents,

will then remain at high quality for up to three months and will still be as 'fresh' as eggs stored for seven days at room temperature. They can be stored for longer periods but the quality will begin to deteriorate. The cartons reduce water loss and help prevent flavours from other foods from being absorbed into the eggs. When storing eggs it is important to only store clean, uncracked eggs. Keep dirty or cracked eggs separate to avoid contamination of the clean eggs, these eggs should

also be used immediately or frozen as pulp.

Under no circumstances should eggs for in-shell storage be washed as this removes the surface bloom and makes the eggs more susceptible to attack by microbes.

So there you have it, avoid washing eggs before storage (separate dirty eggs from clean ones), refriger-

ate as soon as possible and store in egg cartons. I guess the key is that enjoy the best from your fresh eggs, eat them as soon as possible and don't undercook.

Autumn weeds: Monitoring and control Due to the summer rains there has been a notable increase in the number of

broadleaf weed species in paddocks. This in turns can affect how you plan the timing of your chemical weed control

If you opt to begin your weed control now chances are you will need to undertake further control in winter if the opening rains are significant. On the other hand, if the dry period continues, weeds could go into a semi-dormant state which would reduce the effect of the chemical control.

With this taken into consideration, there are two suggested options:

- I. If your pasture has a minimal amount of weeds, it may be best to do nothing wait and see how the season develops, and if possible graze your paddocks to keep weeds under control.
- 2. If weeds are dominant, consider carrying out your weed control now, as well as grazing your paddocks.

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
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
