"I thank your Community Association for giving me this opportunity to introduce myself through the Community Newsletter.

My name is John GRAETZ and I have been stationed at the Clarendon Police Station since October, 1991. My area of responsibility takes in part of Cherry Gardens as well as the Clarendon, Kangarilla, Kuitpo and Prospect Hill areas. My boundary stops at the junction of Cherry Gardens Road, Ironbank Road and Ackland Hill Road. All areas to the south of this junction towards Clarendon is my responsibility. Ackland Hill Road is covered by Darlington Patrols and Ironbank by Stirling Patrols.

I live at the Clarendon Police Station residence, alongside the Police Station and am available 24 hours per day, if required. If I am not at home, or away from the area, the telephone will be diverted to the Darlington Police Station and they will be able to assist. I am the only Officer stationed at Clarendon and cover both patrol duties as well as station work. Please bear with me if I am not around when you ring or call in. If you need to attend the Station for business it is preferable to ring first and this may save you a trip for nothing. Blackwood Police Station is also available to you, Monday to Friday, during the day.

To date, I have not had a lot of Police work in the Cherry Gardens area. You may think that a lot happens in your area, but I have not been informed. You are my eyes and ears in the Cherry Gardens area, so if you see or hear anything you feel I should know, please don't hesitate to call and let me know. If you see a suspicious vehicle or person hanging around your house or the neighbours, try to get a registration number of any vehicle and let me know. Remember to always lock-up and to look-out as you move around your area and together we will keep it the quite area it appears to be. Coromandel Valley receives plenty of attention from Criminals in relation to break-ins, and your area is just a short trip up the road.

I consider myself to be fairly approachable, so if you have any problems in relation to Police matters, give me a call. I will do my best to assist you. Thanks for listening."

DISTRICT HISTORY WORD SEARCH

In 1838 three men Edward Burgess, Henry FI--- and --AA- Jacobs while searching for feed for stock east of Happy Valley found a locality which looked promising. These three men cut a quantity of what is now known as K-----OO grass for their stock then rested under a tree.

This tree was unusual as the fruit had the ST--- on the outside instead of inside the fruit and as there were a number of these trees around and they were similar in colour to the cherry they called the place Cherry ----EN-.

Edward Burgess never lived in Cherry Gardens however later lived in ----DON. He arrived in South Australia aboard the -ORO---- in 1837 and a neighbouring suburb was named after this ship. Mr. Jacobs and his wife Elizabeth arrived in South Australia in 1837 from the Isle of W---T. They resided for some time on the banks of the river --RR--- and in 1838 South Australia's first white son was born to them.

The third man Henry formally of K--- England settled on what is now known as CH---- paddock and resided there for many years.

These early pioneers cleared their land and won a livelyhood by means of W---- and --TAT-- growing. Following these early arrivals were the Broadbents who had arrived in South Australia on the ship --FF--- with Governor ---D---SH. A number of settlers soon followed these including Joseph Boothey, Joseph Middleton Mr. and Mrs. John CH----S.

Mr. Chambers bred -OR--- on land locally known as The -U-. He found an export market in I-D-- for stock and was also an explorer in the Northern Territory. Early religious services were held at the home of Mr. Field until 1849 when a chapel was built by the Bible CHR----- and Wesleyan ----OD---S who had amalgamated. This building is still being regularly used for services and is the oldest Methodist Chapel south of Adelaide. The first Post Office listed at Cherry Gardens was in 1851 and the Postmasters name was Mr. John WH--E.

Up until 1882 the grounds of the Chapel yard were used as the local ---ETE-- and the last to be buried there was Isaac -AC--- in 1894 one of the district founders. In 1882 the present cemetery was opened and the first burials were Mr. and Mrs. M---ERE-- of Scotts Creek.

Education of the children was done at a -RI---- school in the early days until the first government school was built. Its construction was of pug and then roofed with ----W. A F-----LY society the "Morning Star" Tent No. 6, Independent order of Rechabites was established in 1861. The early meetings were held in private residences until in 1894 the --CHA---- Hall was erected.

The ----ATI-- Army established an outpost at Cherry Gardens towards the end of the last century. In 1906 a Hall was built where they held their meetings. The Great War of 1914-18 took its toll on the district with many enlisted men losing their

lives. As a tribute to their memory a --LDI--- Memorial Park was established in 1923, a Golden ----SS tree was planted for each man lost. A ---SS of Remembrance was erected in 1935.

HORSE CARE HINTS

- * to produce a good shine on rubber boots, use a little furniture polish from an aerosol
- * to give a more professional touch to your rugs, add your initials to the nearside corner. Either buy the letters individually (from saddlers, needlework or craft shops) or make your own by drawing a paper template, pinning it on to a square of felt, and cutting around it. You can then stitch it into position
- * use a piece of baler twine to hang up a penknife or a pair of scissors near to your supply of hay or straw, ready to cut open the bales
- * tie a knot in the end of your lead rope when leading your horse, so that it does not slip through your hands. Wear gloves too, so that if he tries to pull away you have a better grip and thus avoid burning the palms of your hands
- * remove bot fly eggs with a disposable plastic safety razor. This is far cheaper than buying a bot knife

CRAIGBURN FARM

Craigburn Farm, is it just another farm or is it something special?

Many drive past it never casting a thought as to why it's there or what is its future, it has been accepted as permanent open space.

Minda Inc. bought the farm in 1923 as an outreach from its Brighton facilities and has used it to help some of its clients develop certain farm and other skills.

In 1972 the Meadows (now Happy Valley) and Mitcham Council brought in regulations to allow housing on both sides of Sturt Creek. I moved a disallowance motion in Parliament at the time in an attempt to keep it open space. Over recent years most of the land on the southern side suitable for housing has been developed.

In 1985 the Minda Board sought to create a large amount of housing on the north side, the Government sought to stop it by using powers under the planning act. Minda countered this move by issuing a writ in the Supreme Court.

This forced the Government to retreat and set up a committee to report not later than October 1985, the report has never been made public but it appears it was completed in 1989 or 1990.

The Minister has now released a supplementary development plan (S.D.P.), which allows for up to 150 hectares, (350 acres) for development with allotment sizes down to smaller than a tennis court. The balance of the land, which includes most of the steep areas is planned to be open space. There is to be a Government payment towards the open space but we have not been told how much.

The Craigburn Farm is a magnificent property if bought by the people, i.e. the Government, by 6 instalments of approximately 4 Million Dollars over the next ten years, it will be a treasure that present and future generations could always enjoy.

Through different bad management deals, our state has lost over 3,000 Million Dollars, by committing ourselves to Craigburn at least we have a beautiful and valuable asset.

I encourage concerned citizens to rally at Hewitt Oval, Coromandel Parade at 12 noon on the 27th of June. More details published later, in the meantime view the project at the Blackwood Library and send letter of concern to the Minister of Environment and Premier Bannon with copies to your local member.

Whatever happens please do not criticise the magnificent work Minda does for our disabled, they have a right and in fact a responsibility to get full compensation for the property on behalf of their clients, our disabled.

Our beef has to be to convince the Government that this beautiful open space is too valuable to be destroyed so it must be bought for the people.


