EDITORIAL - CFS COMMUNICATIONS

The CFS Sturt Group consists of the Cherry Gardens, Belair, Blackwood, Coromandel Valley and Eden Hills Brigades. There are two teams which manage the communication



for the Sturt group, and they are based at Cherry Gardens and at Belair. Both these have a radio base at the station. The teams take week about to respond to the Brigades' communication needs.

The Cherry Gardens Communications Team is currently looking for new members to bolster their numbers. Being a member of the communications team does not involve fighting fires or attending any other incidents; the communications team acts as a conduit between the Brigade members attending an incident and Adelaide Fire, which is the communications hub for all incidents throughout the state. An incident can be a motor vehicle accident, a tree down, an injured animal or, of course, a fire, either a structure fire or a grass fire.

The communications team keeps a record of what is occurring at the incident, and can also arrange attendance by police, ambulance, SA Power Network or other agencies if that is requested by the Incident Controller. The camaraderie between the team members is great, and of course we also join with our fantastic Brigade members for barbeques and other functions. We usually train on a Monday night, although COVID has of course meant we have been unable to attend the base for a few months. New members receive full training and support. Inside this edition you will see some information on how you can contact members of the team if you think you may be interested. There is of course no obligation, but we hope an information night will help you to decide whether it is something you may wish to pursue. The communications team would welcome your involvement in what is a very rewarding way to play a vital role in the community.

CHERRY GARDENS CFS

We train every Monday night for those who may be interested in what we do.



The CFS has been very quiet so far this winter, with only a

few calls in the last few months. The COVID 19 restrictions are starting to ease which will see us slowly returning to our full training schedule and resuming with various projects in and around the station.

Our appliances are obviously very visible when they are out and about, a description of their roles and capabilities may be of interest. Based at the Cherry Gardens station are "Cherry Gardens 34P", "Cherry Gardens 34" and the Sturt Group Bulk water carrier "Sturt BWC 13". A note regarding call signs – a three four appliance is designated that way as it carries 3000 litres of water and is fourwheel drive. You may notice one fours/four fours/ two fours in other brigades which follow this same format. **S**turt **B**ulk **W**ater **C**arrier 13 was originally set up to carry 13,000 litres of water.



Cherry Gardens 34P

This appliance is set up for not only bushfires, but also it has an urban capability. It has four Breathing Apparatus (BA) sets which are needed for structure fires. They enable the specially trained amongst us to enter burning houses or sheds if it is safe to do so. It will be responded initially to these events by Adelaide fire, with extra back up as required.

Cherry Gardens 34

Outwardly physically the same as 34P but is specifically set up for bushfire events. It is the first appliance to be paged for bushfire and grass fires. It has no BA sets, but a bigger range of hoses and pumps to deal with these fires. It has in the past travelled both interstate and within SA for major fire campaigns, and recently served for an extended time on Kangaroo Island during that prolonged fire.

Sturt Group BWC 13

This is a bulk water tanker belonging to the Sturt Group, based and generally operated by the Cherry Gardens brigade. It also has a state-of-the-art foam suppression system but that is another complete story. A large part of its funding came from the local Hills community and it is a great asset to be based in Cherry Gardens.

GEORGE'S GARDENING SUGGESTIONS FOR JUNE 2020

Quite a lot of pruning can be done this month. If you have a mulcher, prunings can be reduced to material which will make great compost. Even without a mulcher you can spread your prunings out on the ground and run over them with the mower, first on the highest setting and progressively lowering the blades, finally rake it into a pile and compost it. Compost can take quite a while to mature in the winter, try to have a mix of green and brown vegetation together with some form of manure for a good brew.

Improve your soil fertility and texture by adding compost made during summer/autumn in readiness for spring plantings. For those of you who like to be picking tomatoes before Christmas plant them out later this month and protect from frost. With warming soil in the spring, they will flower before the really hot conditions arrive and should have a good fruit set.

Other vegetables to plant are peas, broccoli, cabbage, onions, radish, potatoes, spring onions, broad beans and some more snow peas for a continuous harvest.

Keep weeds down and continue your watch out for snails.

Citrus planting should be held off until the warmer weather arrives, but the site should be prepared now in readiness.

As soon as buds swell on peaches/nectarines it is time to spray with a copper-based spray to minimise leaf-curl. Bulbs of hippeastrums, gladiolus, and lilies can be planted now, check out your local nursery for some interesting



colours.

Why not try some alyssum, calendula, candytuff, larkspur or stocks for some spring colour?

OVER THE STABLE DOOR with Hamish

Greetings Fellow Equines and Horse Owners!

It's lovely to have the rain and green paddocks, but of course that comes with its own problems. With horses, 90% of ailments start at the hoof and work up from there, so if



your neddy is not feeling right or not moving 'right', then the best place to start investigating is at the hoof. Warm moist conditions certainly will bring out conditions like abscesses, thrush, founder and greasy heel. Regular maintenance such as cleaning out the feet will help keep the foot free of infection. When done regularly, this also enables the owner to become familiar with each horse's feet. It will soon become obvious that there may be one hoof which is always warmer to hold that the other 3. This may be 'normal' for that horse. The other 3 feet may feel consistently cooler. This knowledge will enable the owner to quickly notice any change in temperature. A normal healthy hoof is generally cool to hold and as with humans, heat will indicate some sort of problem, such as

it may work upwards and come out through the coronet. Once out though, the horse recovers quite spectacularly. Some horses are more prone to abscesses than others and having had one, may have another the following year. Poulticing or soaking in a bucket of warm water with Epsom salts may work – or not!

infection, injury or even a stone lodged under the hoof.

Nothing will make a horse as lame as an abscess. The heat is generally quite localised and sometimes a good farrier can dig it out. If it is located higher up, Thrush is very easy to detect as it smells (stinks). Keeping your horse out of muddy areas and regular cleaning will help prevent this condition.

Founder is a big topic on its own, and will discuss this at another time.

Greasy heel is quite a nasty infection often affecting horses with white socks and pink skin underneath. The skin becomes red raw and cracks, can even bleed and make the horse lame, thrives in warm moist conditions. Keep the area as dry as possible. Horse may have to be stabled. This condition can be quite slow to heal, so it pays to be vigilant. Usually the first sign will be at the back of the pastern, which is quite easy to palpate as the hoof is picked up for cleaning. That area should feel smooth and clean. If there is any greasy heel present, there will be a bit of a scab and the horse may react to it being touched. Immediately inspect and dry the area. There are various ointments on the market which can be used to treat this condition, but as always best to have a chat with your vet.

We horses cannot speak, so it is up to our owners to train themselves to be very observant and familiar with what is 'normal' for each individual horse. Also we don't like to show pain, as in the herd situation, this can make us vulnerable. So sometimes it may be the smallest sign such as; a slightly smaller eye, pinched nostrils, ears back, a tail swish, reluctance to be led, lack of interest in food or surroundings, or any other change in behaviour.

We thrive on good care, good food and good company – I know I do!

ANZAC DAY - LOCAL HISTORY



ALEPPO PINE

PINUS HALEPENSIS

THE A.I.F. ATTACK ON AND HOLDING OF LONE PINE RIDGE GALLIPOLI, AUGUST 1915

After severe fighting, members of the Australian Imperial Force on 6th August 1915 took the high and strategic Lone Pine Ridge. Several days of extremely heavy Turkish counterattacking followed. Over 2,000 Australian and 7,000 Turkish soldiers were killed. Seven Australian's were awarded the Victoria Cross.

An Australian Soldier who took part in the action, in which his brother was killed, took a cone from one of the pine tree logs used by the Turks as overhead cover for their trenches. He later sent it to his mother back in Australia. From a seed shed by this cone, she grew a seedling Pine Tree.

In 1934 the Duke of Gloucester planted this tree in the grounds of the Australian War Memorial, Canberra, in memory of the Australians who fell at Lone Pine.


The tree growing in the Cherry Gardens Soldiers Memorial Park was raised from seed taken from the original tree in Canberra. It was planted here in 2016 following the unfortunate actions of an Onkaparinga Council worker who cut down the Lone Pine that was planted here in 2001 by Jack and Margaret Jacobs at the Rededication Ceremony following the renovations of the Memorial Park.

This tree is planted in memory of all persons who served in defense of Australia, and in particular those who paid the supreme sacrifice.

CITY OF ONKAPARINGA THALASSA WARD COUNCILLOR UPDATE

Reopened for business - Arts, Libraries and more

As the state government's COVID-19 restrictions continue to ease, council is working hard to reopen its sites and resume services as soon as we can. For those who enjoy the arts and culture – the Port Noarlunga Arts Precinct reopened for business during the first week of June. The Arts Centre and Sauerbier House were forced to close due to COVID-19 in March, but both provided access to scheduled exhibitions online and they've now opened their physical doors in the wake of easing government restrictions. Visitors can enjoy two exhibitions at the Arts Centre and two exhibitions and an artist-in residence experience at Sauerbier House, encompassing video, photography, paper collages, glass art, drawing, and digital illustration. Some conditions of entry - around social distancing, contact tracing and hand hygiene – apply to all visitors on arrival.

Our libraries, tourist parks and the McLaren Vale and Fleurieu Coast Visitor Centre are also open, with some conditions applying.

The Arts Centre has launched an online Arts Shop, showcasing works for sale from talented local artists, including jewellery, prints, original artworks, glassware, ceramics, textiles and more. Community Consultation - Draft Community Plan, Local Area Plan, Business Plan and Budget 20-21 Council is asking for feedback on three major plans that will shape the future of our city for the short and long term during June and the results of this should be before Council late July

The draft Community Plan 2030 is council's lead strategic document and it describes the future the city aspires to. It guides council decisions and makes sure efforts are directed to what best serves people today and into the future. While it represents council's shared vision for 2030, the plan is reviewed and updated within two years of each council election, with the most recent version released in 2017.

The draft Onkaparinga Local Area Plan is a partnership between council and the State Planning Commission and will provide an outline of where, how and when we plan for different types of urban development to occur over the next 10 to 20 years, and what strategic infrastructure and services will be required to enable this development. The City of Onkaparinga's population is expected to grow by 22,000 people by 2040, so the plan will allow council to be prepared and respond to current and future growth opportunities and challenges.

The draft Annual Business Plan and Budget for 2020-21 includes a number of relief measures to support our communities, including a proposed zero percent rate revenue increase. I have encouraged residents to provide feedback via Council's Yoursay page.

Community wellbeing and resilience grants available

In April, Council approved a new community grant to support our residents' social isolation, mental health, financial security and food security in the face of the pandemic. The \$50,000 community wellbeing and resilience fund is used to support existing community groups that are working with individuals and families, particularly disadvantaged ones, by expanding their programs or creating new ones. The grants – with between \$500 and \$2000 available to each applicant - are open to any incorporated community group operating within the City of Onkaparinga. The first round of applications closed in late May and Round 2 is scheduled to open on Wednesday 17 June. If your incorporated group offers things like counselling services, health and wellbeing programs, support for the socially isolated, financial planning advice and support, employment and training programs, or food programs in our city, I'd encourage you to apply at onkaparingacity.com.

Together we can ease the strain on our communities and ensure meaningful relief is provided to those who really need it. You'll find a list of council's other COVID-19 relief measures at our website.

Council Funding for Upgrade of Change Facilities – Cherry Gardens Ironbank Recreation Goud. Following the successful Department for Recreation and Sport grant for the change facilities at the recreation ground \$277,000 has been committed by council to this important project and our staff are working with the committee on this project.

CHERRY HISTORY CORNER

From time to time we are fortunate to receive emails from families of pioneer settlers of Cherry Gardens who share snippets of information about their ancestors.

Recently Colin Mildwaters sent us an email with some of his research into the Mildwaters who lived here early in the settlement of South Australia. Thanks Colin!

GEORGE KELLAWAY MILDWATER - 1815 - 1900

George was the son of George and Rebecca Mildwater. He was baptised at the Lillington Parish Church, Dorset England on 8 October 1815. His second Christian name appears to be derived from his mother's maiden name which appears on her Marriage record as Kellaway. George married Eliza Yearbury at the Parish Church, Parish of Castleton, County of Dorset on 18 December 1837. The Civil Registration of the Marriage shows George's profession as Cabinet Maker and that of Eliza as Servant. George's name appears as GEORGE KELLAWAY MILDWATER.

On 31 January 1839, George made application for free passage to South Australia under an Immigration Labour Scheme. He is aged 24 years, his wife aged 20 years and they have one child (female) aged 10 months. His address is given as Sherborne.

George is shown on the Passenger List as having arrived on the ship "Asia" from London on 16 July 1839. When their first son George Kellaway was baptised at the Holy Trinity Church on 5 November 1840, the parent's address at that time was West Terrace and George Kellaway's occupation was that of a carpenter. By January 1841 they were living in Gilbert St Adelaide. In the Census of 1841, there is an entry for George Mildwaters describing both he and his wife being under 35 years and having one male child under 7 years.

Soon after this they moved to Scott Creek.

William Rowe Hill appears to be the first settler in this area (Scott Creek) about 12 miles from Adelaide in about 1840. Hill was joined by two others around 1842 - Joseph Brown and George Mildwater and their families. The naming of the area is recorded as -

"a Mr Scott brought his flock of sheep and pitched a camp in the

vicinity of Mildwater's selection. That was near the bottom of the creek, near where it empties into the Onkaparinga. The people of Cherry Gardens would refer to that locality as Scott's Bottom – from that circumstance, poorly advised (I think), officials named the whole stream Scott's Creek." According to C | Hill the settlers arrived and took possession of blocks before the area was surveyed. During this time the settlers had no land title and could not prevent woodcutters coming from Adelaide to fell trees on their blocks. The land was pegged in 1848. Even once the land was pegged it still had to be put to the hammer and bought (hopefully) by the occupying settler. "There was great anxiety, as anyone can imagine – a man might lose his many years' labour should he be outbidden. Luckily for these heroic pioneers they had "sit 'em down" in an out of the way place, for it was the ultima thule of civilization in those days and for many years afterwards."9 George Mildwater was granted Section 286 hundred of Noarlunga on 24 November 1854 – 260 acres for 260

Noarlunga on 24 November 1854 – 260 acres for 260 pounds 5 shillings.¹⁰

"A little copper mining had been going on. The bullock drays had been dragging over the surface croppings of a lode of copper ore, at a spot afterwards named "The Alamanda" Several attempts were made for copper. The lode was too small, or poor, or copper was in low price. But in 1868 a Captain Ey professed to have made an analysis and found it rich in silver. Tremendous excitement prevailed. A company was formed, machinery was erected, shares were made and sold, as also were the purchasers, as it turned out afterwards."¹¹

On 17 August 1868 G. Mildwater entered into an agreement with Mackereth Silver Mining Co. to allow them to search for minerals on his land. On 21 December 1868 this was converted to a 21-year lease (from 31 August 1868) for mineral purposes with

Mildwater to obtain 1/20 of profits per year. This lease was surrendered on 7 October 1875.¹²

The boom brought short term prosperity and employment but in the end according to C J Hill "The game was up. The original shareholders "struck ile" but those who bought had "busted". I have no hesitation in saying that the whole thing was a colossal humbug. But money circulated. All Scott's Creek benefited, at a time when the outlook was blue."

George and Eliza had 10 children with Georgiana being the first born in 1838 and Henry being the last born in 1868. Their first son was born in 1840 and in keeping with the family tradition was named George. George and Eliza moved to Cherry Gardens in their retirement and bought a 10-acre property here. Their property at Scott Creek was around 260 acres and their son James (5th born child) remained to run the property. George died on 22 April 1900 at Cherry Gardens, South Australia. He was 85 years of age and the cause of his death was recorded as senile decay. George was buried at Cherry Gardens Cemetery on 24 April 1900. There is no headstone.

George's Obituary appeared in the South Australian Register (Adelaide) on 24 April 1900 and again in The Advertiser on 25 April 1900. It read:

THE LATE MR. G. K. MILDWATER.

Another old colonist, Mr. G. K. Mildwater, of Cherry Gardens, passed away on Sunday, April 22. The deceased gentleman arrived in the colony by the ship Asia in the year 1839, and being unable to follow his trade-that of a cabinetmaker, obtained employment in the building of several Government works around Adelaide, and was also employed at the Murray erecting a building for the Police Department, after which he settled at Scott's Creek, and followed farming and fruit growing. The garden at the present time contains a splendid apple tree in full bearing, which was planted by Mrs. Mildwater nearly 50 years ago. Deceased had reached the age of 85 years, and almost up to the last his memory of events of early colonial life was wonderfully good. He leaves a widow and seven children, Mrs Jacobs, of Franklin Harbor, and Mrs Light, of Coromandel Valley, being the only surviving daughters. There are also 45 grandchildren and 30 great-grandchildren.

Eliza died in August 1907, aged 87 years and was buried at Cherry Gardens Cemetery on I September 1907. The cemetery records do not show where she is buried. Her Obituary appeared in The Chronicle on 7 September 1907 and read:

The death of Mrs. Mildwaters occurred at her residence, Cherry Gardens, on Saturday. The deceased, who was 87 years of age, came to South Australia, with her late husband, Mr. George Mildwaters, in the ship Asia in March, 1839. Mr. and Mrs. Mildwaters settled first on the Murray, afterwards living at the junction of Scott's Creek and the Onkaparinga River. They were among the first selectors at Scott's Creek, where they engaged first in wheat growing and mixed farming, then in potato growing and woodcutting, and finally, in mining. On retiring from active life Mr. and Mrs. Mildwaters went to reside at Cherry Gardens, where Mr. Mildwaters died about seven years ago. There are six surviving children (Messrs. James and Robert Mildwaters, of Scott's Creek; Messrs. John and Edward Mildwaters, of Western Australia; Mrs. W. Jacobs, of Franklin Harbor; and Mrs. John Light, of Coromander Valley), 51 grandchildren, and 60 great-grandchildren.

ARTS CENTRE

Dan's observational and illustrative work is balanced with Emma's abstractions in a vivid celebration of colour, pattern and form in nature. PORT NOARLUNGA SPORTS BOOST

Port Noarlunga's growing sporting population has received a boost, with council approving a \$3.1 million redevelopment proposal for the Port Noarlunga Sports Ground.

The redevelopment, which would be undertaken in two stages and is subject to external funding, would involve demolishing existing changerooms and clubrooms and building a new facility to consolidate various ageing buildings across the site.

It comes in the wake of a 2016 audit by the South Australian National Football League that found player and umpire changerooms are of a poor standard and inadequate amid growing participation in women's football.

There's also currently a duplication of facilities across the site, while the distance of the primary clubrooms from the oval is seen by head lessee Port Noarlunga Sports and Community Club (PNSCC) as being a major barrier to the facility's functionality and social activation. The new proposed facility would be built closer to the oval and court and include four unisex changerooms with amenities; four umpire's changerooms; a social space; kitchen, kiosk; oval spectator area; toilets; medical room; office spaces; and internal and externally accessible storage.

City of Onkaparinga Mayor Erin Thompson says the redevelopment will have a huge impact on the entire community.

"The Port Noarlunga Sports Ground is used by local football, cricket, netball, tennis and gridiron clubs; community groups such as surf clubs and fitness clubs; and for music and social events such as the Port Noarlunga Blues Festival.

"Playing sport and staying active can help people stay healthy and be better connected to their community, so we're thrilled to have a way forward for this redevelopment, particularly amid the huge increase in women's participation. "The new facility will provide new community spaces including the social space and kitchen, both for club members and creating further opportunities for revenue generation through community use and events."

Council has approved \$1.55 million toward construction in the draft budget, which is still subject to community feedback and final Council endorsement. Council will now work with the PNSCC to progress detailed design and cost estimates and pursue additional funding.

The investment complements council's ongoing investment in facilities for AFL, cricket, soccer, netball, hockey and tennis, including a commitment to upgrade Aldinga Sports Park in partnership with the federal government, facilities at the Flagstaff Hill Sports Ground and the 2019 upgrade of Kangarilla Recreation Ground's courts and lighting.
