So, we thought it might be a good idea to introduce a Book Exchange in our local area. They are usually located in parks, playgrounds, sports fields, anywhere it can be accessible, so we will be locating our Book Exchange at the Recreational Ground at the end of Cherry Gardens Road, between the Netball/Tennis clubrooms and the main clubroom.

The Book Exchange aims to encourage literacy and a love of books without visiting a traditional library. There are already a number of Book Exchanges throughout South Australia from Gawler to Cape Jervis and throughout regional areas. At present the nearest one to Cherry Gardens is at Weymouth Oval in Coromandel Valley.

The Book Exchanges come in a variety of shapes, sizes and colours. They are basically a small house-shaped bookshelf with doors on the front. Some examples are shown below. Ours is being constructed as we speak by a local, Erik Annett, and we look forward to the final product.





We plan to install the Book Exchange during September and would encourage readers or those wanting to be readers to visit and select a book. We will load the exchange initially, and to ensure it provides a service to the community, please replace any book you take with another that someone might enjoy.

Please let your friends and neighbours know about the Book Exchange at the Recreation Ground if they are not aware. It may take some time for it to become known, but we hope it adds to the wonderful community of Cherry Gardens and neighbouring Ironbank

Several groups from Cherry Gardens were successful in receiving grants recently from the City of Onkaparinga. Community groups gathered at the annual Grants Presentation Ceremony, Erin Thompson - Mayor, City of Onkaparinga presented sporting clubs, service groups, schools, churches and a range of community groups with grants for their initiatives.

The Memorial Hall was successful in 3 areas. We can now purchase new A frames that are heavy duty, lightweight but with a base that can be filled with water or sand for stability to publicise our events - watch out for them on the roadside soon!

We will also purchase 2 smaller commercial fridges to replace our existing aging large fridge. This way we can choose to run just one for smaller functions, making us more energy efficient and hopefully encourage more hiring's by improving our amenities.

We also received a Minor Capital Works Grant to go towards a major upgrade of our storeroom facilities. They are poorly lit, cramped & no longer weatherproof and not adequate for our current needs. Increasing the size and widening the door will make the area more accessible and easier to clean.

Thank you to the City of Onkaparinga for making all this possible. The changes should happen quickly, and we hope you will consider using the Hall for your next event.

Leanne's story-

"I joined CFS during a time in my life where I was about to face a severe threat at work. I thought that giving back to the community would give me a sense of belonging in spite of what happens to my career. I had friends already in Cherry Gardens CFS and I asked if I could come along and see what it was like. Before I knew it, I was operating hoses and learning about pumps all on my first day. I was included as if I had been there for months.

A year later, wow, what an experience. I underestimated the roles of CFS and just how much CFS ended up contributing to my wellbeing. Coming from a career of high judgment to the CFS who has no judgment was strange to me. I felt a sense of belonging despite inexperience and being one of a few girls in a male dominated area. Never did anyone say, no you cannot do that, it is more like, come and have a go. They had more faith in me than myself. For example, I was nominated to get my chainsaw license. I was nervous and questioned if they were sure I was suitable. My trainer said "I believe you are suitable and you can do this, but if you don't want to, no problem." There is never any pressure. Consequently, I did it and achieved more than I thought I could.

This is just one of the many positive experiences I have had. There is no limit to CFS, age or otherwise. You choose your limit. I admit it is challenging physically, I am 47 years old and have a fitness background and yes, it can be tough and dangerous, but that is what creates energy. You know, that energized feeling after a walk or a workout. My favorite part of CFS is the diverse multidiscipline dynamics of the members. The diversity in careers and experience is what makes even more interesting than the training.

The feeling of being valued and the loyalty created in CFS cannot be replicated in paid employment. There is something special about it. I wish I joined earlier. For anyone who is struggling, please seek the courage to join a volunteer group, it will give you back meaning in your life"

George's Gardening Suggestions for September 2019

Spring is the busiest time of the year for gardeners, with everything bursting into life as well as everyone wanting to show or tell you about what is happening in their garden. Open Gardens SA have a full program of gardens you can visit in Spring and there will be a new one in their program this year at 395 Ironbank Rd which will be open on the 6th and 7th of October. I know the garden and can thoroughly recommend a visit.

As well as all of the plants and trees enjoying this time of the year so do the pests, so be on guard. Snails and slugs love fresh new growth, fungal diseases are prevalent and need to be dealt with. Aphids on roses are often controlled by predators, eventually, but can be washed off with a jet of water. Give black spot on roses a spray with a milk spray - I-part full cream milk to 10 parts water.

We have been warned that it will be a lot dryer this Spring and Summer so now is the time to prepare by mulching heavily to conserve moisture and keep the soil cool. Plant out all seedlings as soon as you can so they have well established root systems before the hot weather arrives.

In the vegetable garden a few old favourites to plant this and next month are - cherry tomatoes, loose leaf lettuce to have a continuous harvest, beetroot, cucumber, silver beet, bush beans, and capsicum.

Some flowers to plant are - asters, carnations, sunflowers, zinnias, and celosias.

The Last Meeting

July is the month for our Winter Warmers evening. At an early 6:30pm start we were greeted by wonderful savoury, tea-time odours, drifting through the building. Even more warming was the chatter as everyone greeted each other. Earlier four members had carried in their Crock pots of 4 choices of soup and others their contributions of dessert slices. Crusty bread and cheese were provided. How great to sit down face to face with members, some of whom we may not have had the opportunity to chat with in the past.

When we were all well sated by delicious food and conversation, all signs of tea were cleared away and we drew our chairs into a circle for "Gardening Tips and Tricks".

 Jot down gardening ideas, chores and thoughts in an old diary. Date and cross off and comment when you've done the chore, creating a record of and a reminder for that day next year.

- To secure Sweet Peas from ravaging wind, coil Tiewire around a piece of dowel or wooden spoon handle as many times as you need clips. Slide the coil off and use wire cutters to cut through it lengthwise, leaving small c shapes which can then simply be pushed on to secure the stem to the trellis;
- Prepare plant labels in advance, for plants which have been potted up to give away to friends, charities or as contributions to the auction at monthly garden club meetings;
- Dry out, crush and store egg-shells ready to add to worm farms, or to use as non-toxic snail deterrents around seedlings;
- Sprinkle spent coffee grounds sparingly around acid loving plants and shrubs or add greater quantities to compost bins, great for reducing PH levels in our alkaline garden soil;
- One live-alone, club member uses large clamps, sold at mega hardware stores as a second pair of hands to grip or anchor items when doing a "two persons" job;
- Paint various garden tools in different, bright, colours in order to spot them easily in the garden, shed or if absentmindedly laid down in the wrong place!
- Add a mulching kit to ride on mowers to save having to rake up and mulch leaves and mowings;
- Label and date all seeds gathered from the garden then file in a card index box for easy retrieval;
- Push a carnation support over new plants or bulbs to remind you they are there;
- Hedging lavender bushes instead of growing singly as shrubs adds interest to the garden;
- Use plastic liners, under wicking beds;
- Use shade cloth under compost bins to keep pesky tree roots out, but cut a couple of holes to allow earth worms entry or escape in hot weather;
- "Water Ups from Down under" wicking beds from Mark at "Adelaide Hills veggie gardens";
- Stick a rose cutting into a potato and bury it for great rooting results;
- Plant seeds in a ½ Orange or Grapefruit peel and bury;
- Prune your roses exactly 56 days before a function to ensure a great display of blooms;
- Bury bottomless used paper coffee cups in which you've planted your cuttings and seedlings;
- Soak root vegetable seeds in hot water for a few minutes before planting, speeding germination;
- Stick a length of holey agricultural pipe vertically down into compost bins for aeration;
- Kill broad leafed plants with non-toxic boiling water;
- Lay cardboard on moist, weedy soil and cover with mulch to improve soil;
- Fill a punctured 3 litre milk carton and let it leak out next to isolated plants for slow effective watering;
- Kangaroos don't like Kale or Silver beet ensuring a crop in the hills!

- Propagate Bird's nest ferns by sprinkle spores over Zygocactus plants or onto a damp brick. The hormones in female saliva causes cuttings to strike;
- Pot up to no larger than 50% bigger. So 200ml pot repotted to 300ml.
- Hang old cracked bamboo filled coffee mugs or teacups in trees to provide excellent "native bee hotels"
- To cool worm farms on hot days, yoghurt container of ice in middle of food and cover with wet hessian bag.

By the end of the evening we were all fired up to go home and put these clever ideas into practice. Our formal meeting was opened with the great news of a grant won to assist with our planned 20th anniversary celebratory dinner, scheduled for October!

OVER THE STABLE DOOR with Hamish

Greetings Fellow Equines and Horse Owners!

Last month we looked at taking care of grazing areas, the outside of the horse and his rugs. The inside of the horse also needs taking care



of! Assuming that pasture and feed is under control; let's look inside the horses' mouth. Tests have shown that a horse can make as many as 40,000 chews per day, and he has evolved to do just that. The horse basically has 6 lots of teeth in sets of 6, making a minimum of 36 teeth. So, in the front top and bottom there are 2 lots of 6 the incisors. These top and bottom teeth are used for cutting the grass off to get into the mouth. On either side top and bottom are the molars. These are used for grinding the grass/hay ready for digesting. The molars act in a sideways action as they grind. However, the top jaw is wider than the bottom jaw and the sideways action doesn't always include the complete surface of its opposing partner. Over time, if not looked at professionally, hooks can develop on the outside of the upper molars and on the inside of the lower molars. What can happen then is that those hooks will gouge into the flesh on the inside of the cheek. In severe cases, these holes become filled with rotting food, becoming septic, causing pain and even death (I kid ye not!). Signs that all may not be well noted include difficulty eating, quidding (dropping bits of food), bad breath, bridling problems, resistance, problems in turning and even shutting down (not being his usual bright self).

Young horses up to around the age of 5 or 6 have baby teeth which are eventually replaced by an adult set, so it is recommended that teeth are checked at least every 6 months. After that and depending on the horse itself, teeth can be done on a yearly basis.

Nowadays we are lucky enough to have veterinary professionals who specialise in dentition. They generally operate with a mobile crush and lightly sedate the horse so that a thorough job can be done. Yes, it does cost,

but it is worth it for a thorough job. One of my paddock mates and two of my friends have had experiences of teeth not being done professionally, with uncomfortable to very serious consequences. One was young and developed difficulty turning. This was easily remedied. The next had to have his left ear 'twitched' as the 'dentist' couldn't reach the back teeth. The result was a horse that refused to be bridled or have his ears touched. Incidentally the back teeth never got done by this person. Again, this was remedied by a professional and he has recovered. The other two were in potentially life-threatening situations that could have been due to lack of knowledge or neglect. Both had been in constant pain over a period of years and in both cases it has taken months to get these horses back to good health. Finally, if you are looking at purchasing a horse, do make sure that the vet check includes a good look at the teeth, regardless of when they were last done. It may be cost a bit extra at the time but could save many dollars and a lot of heart ache in the long term. Your horses cannot speak, and they do not always show pain (not obviously anyway), so be on the lookout for changes in behaviour or changes from the norm and follow it up.

Greg Presto tells of mindfulness- "The car had stopped, and so had my mind. No grocery list, no to-do list, no admonishing myself for things undone - just a little yellow bird hanging from his nest, screaming his shrill call



Cultivating mindfulness, or noticing what is happening in the present moment, has all kinds of benefits: If you're mindful while you're eating, paying attention to the taste sensations of your food, you can feel more satisfied and even lower your blood sugar. Being

more mindful can make you more productive at work and better at collaborating. If you practice being mindful, it can change your body's actual response to stress, reducing how much of the stress hormone cortisol is released.

Meditating is the method by which most people tend to try and attain this body-and-mind-improving state. But counting breaths, closing your eyes and concentrating, and other meditations are difficult and sometimes unpleasant - for me and for others. While some people may argue that struggling with meditation is part of the point, it's also discouraging, and can make a mindfulness practice frustrating. When something's frustrating, you're less likely to set aside time to do it.'

Reverend Matthew and Mrs Maria Wilson (nee Smith)

This intrepid couple served the Clarendon Circuit from 1858 to 1869. This circuit included Clarendon, Upper Sturt, Cherry Gardens and Coromandel Valley. Both were born in the industrial city of Bradford, Yorkshire in 1808, they married at the Church of St Peter in Bradford on 9 September 1835. Matthew was a bookkeeper prior to entering the ministry. Matthew was ordained a Methodist Minister at Wesley Chapel, in Southwark,





London on 9 October 1835. Dianne and Darryl visited this beautiful Chapel and Wesley's home, which is on the same allotment, during 2018.

Matthew & Maria Wilson arrived in the Navigator Islands (now known as Samoa) on 15 August 1836 (after leaving England on 13 October 1835) to begin Matthew's Missionary Work among the local population. They didn't muck around! Whilst there Matthew and Maria's first son, John Smith Wilson and first daughter, Elizabeth Thornton Wilson were born. As there was some conflict between the Wesleyans and the London Missionary Society, it was decided that as the Wesleyans arrived in Samoa after the London Missionary Society, they would move out and



hence **Matthew** moved to Tonga in 1839 where he remained until 1854. The rest of their children were born in Tonga. **Daughter** Maria and son William Richard were buried at the village of Felctoa, Lifuka Island, Friendly Islands, the name by which Tonga was previously known.



Matthew Wilson introduced grading of students according to their progress at Hihifo on Tongatapu in the early eighteen forties and found the method very popular amongst his students. The Infant's or Children's School developed by Mrs Maria Wilson at Vava'u proved so successful that it soon spread to the other islands. Young boys and girls now attended and it became very popular. The minutes of The Methodist Conferences, Volume VII of 1838 has Matthew Wilson in Vavau in The Friendly Isles District.

Following the reconciliation between The Tongan ruler, Aleamotu'a and the non-Christian chiefs the mission at Hihifo was re-established, staffed by Reverend Matthew Wilson. The mission-house had been pulled down. leaving Wilson and his family to accept shelter in a house belonging to local Indigenous people. The largest in the fortress at Nuku'alofa, it was low and dark, having no opening but the door.

The Wilson family arrived in South Australia on 25 April 1854. Matthew was stationed at Mount Barker, Burra, Gawler, Yankalilla and Clarendon. In 1854 Matthew was appointed to Mt Barker, 1855 to Kooringa, then in 1858 and 1861 to Clarendon. Reverend Wilson was the first minister to occupy the parsonage erected in 1858 on land donated by Mr. Burgess on The Mount of Olives. "The place was very difficult to access but occupied a position from which a fine view of the surrounding district could be obtained" (1911 report from The Advertiser).

Matthew and Maria had 8 children in total but only 5 survived to adulthood; one died at birth, William died at 18 mths and Maria died at 7 and 3 mths. The other children were John Smith WILSON (1837-1930), Wilson Elizabeth Thornton m KINGSBOROUGH (1838-1879) - both born in Samoa, James Wilson (1840-1919), Sarah Wilson m James LILLYWHITE (1843-1918) and Margaret Wilson m Thomas GOODE (1848-1927). James' son Edgar Hartley WILSON is buried at Blackwood cemetery. They lived in Blackwood for a time prior to his death in 1940

Matthew died of sunstroke at his son's home in Norwood on 29 Ian 1876 during the Methodist Conference. He is buried at West Terrace. Mrs Maria Wilson's name is on the foundation stone of the Old Coromandel Valley Church (1859).

MAX RICKS RECOLLECTIONS

The old Cherry Gang 1960's

The Cherry Gardens monthly dances which were popular and were held on the last Saturday of each month at the Memorial Hall, and people of all ages came from many surrounding districts and also Adelaide. At the conclusion of the dances



which were held on a Saturday night young people would often chatter for a little while at the hall talking to new friends. These were mainly unattached young people, teenage or a little older, and enjoyed the mixed company. In time, this group of about a dozen boys and girls became friends, and it was suggested that we go to other places for outings such as the pictures and dances in other towns as a group.

These people came from Coromandel Valley, Glenalta and some from Adelaide and for 3-4 years we spent our Saturday nights together as a group. I (Max Ricks) was the oldest member of the party nearing 30 years old at the time, and the parents of the younger people were happy to have a non-drinking older person with their children. There was a mixture of teenage and early 20's boys and girls and we had two unspoken rules which we all abided by, no alcohol and no sex.

One thing which we did as a group was to take a load of Home for Incurables people for outings once a month on a Sunday. We would load as many wheelchair patients as our 2-3 ton Bedford truck could hold, and go on picnics or in summer visit the beach. This group of wheelchair people became friends, and we would also take them to restaurants at night when one of them had a birthday. We had no restrictions on what time we had the folks back to the home in Wattle St, Unley, so long as we put them to bed at the finish.

These were lovely times. Another thing which we as a "gang" did was to walk between Cherry Gardens and Adelaide gathering money for Radio Station 5AD Good Friday Appeal for the Adelaide Children's Hospital. This random group of friends entertained together for 3 or 4 years until various marriages and changes of location dissolved the party. But even in 2011 members of the old "Cherry Gang" are still good friends. People who formed the group included Beverley and Phillip Scherer of Coromandel Valley Pam and Barbara Cowan of Glenalta Alan Frith from Adelaide and John Coats and yours truly from Cherry Gardens. Other friends of these people would sometimes come along

CLARENDON AGRICULTURAL BUREAU

The Clarendon Branch the Agricultural Bureau July 2019 meeting speaker was Dene Cordes who formally worked for the various Government Departments that were responsible for managing the South Australian parks and wildlife reserves.

Dene began by providing background about being 4th generation farmers on Kangaroo Island and leaving school early to work on the family farm. He applied for a position with the Belair National Park he was eventually appointed. Dene explained that Belair National Park was declared a National Park in December 1891 and was the second National Park in Australia and the 8th in the World. Dene was appointed by the Minister as the States National Park Community Liaison Officer to deal with the poor relationship between Communities and the States National Park Rangers. With Denes help, the relationship improved, and eventually local consulting groups were created to assist the management of the National Parks and eventually this evolved to become the Friends of National Park Foundation.

Dene stated that the valuable work done by National Park volunteers equates to \$5-6 million per annum in volunteer hours and without the volunteers the National Park would suffer. Dene has been honoured for his work and achievements with being awarded the South Australian Public Service Medal and Australia Day honours.

COUNCILLOR UPDATE - GEOFF EATON

Boundary Reform

There has been no progress in relation to the matter of boundary reform since the City of Marion decided not to proceed with their initiative. A community is able to seek a review of local boundaries, but this requires a petition to be prepared by the community as their own initiative.

Council Rates

Unfortunately due to the increase in the state government waste levee council rates were increased from 1.6% to 2.28%. This is still less than the planned 3.2% proposed under the City of Onkaparinga Financial Plan.

City of Onkaparinga Tourism Plan

This plan was put to Council in June. I raised concerns that it focused on the McLaren Vale and coastal regions with no mention of Cherry Gardens, Coromandel Valley and the historical parts of Clarendon. I suggested that areas are part of the gateway (particularly to the McLaren Vale area these and should be included as they have much to offer by way of walking trails, conservation parks, some great hotels and bakeries, along with some significant historical buildings and a few wineries. This was taken onboard, so I am waiting to see the final outcome.

Community Grants

The Cherry Gardens and Ironbank Recreation Ground was successful in being awarded two grants of \$5,000 each to assist in provision of goal netting for the football

oval and provision of solar panels for the clubrooms. The application for funding to support the Cherry Chatter newsletter was not successful but I will undertake to see whether support can be provided from Council.

Economic Development Forum

I have attended a number of the City of Onkaparinga Economic Development Forum meetings and was concerned that there was no representation of businesses north of Reynella. As a consequence I have had discussions with Jane Silbereisen, president of the Blackwood Business Network (BBN) and council staff. The BBN includes business in the Coromandel Valley area in its network and is prepared to extend its membership to businesses in the Cherry Gardens, Flagstaff Hill, Aberfoyle Park and Clarendon areas, representing them on the Economic Development Forum. Ms Silbereisen attended the Forum's most recent meeting on Wednesday 26 June. The BBN can contacted through their Website www.blackwoodbiz.com.au.

Southern Sports, Recreation and Surf Life Saving Clubs Forum, City of Onkaparinga

I am one of the two elected members appointed to this forum. I have taken on this role to ensure that sporting and recreation clubs in the northern districts of the City of Onkaparinga represented. Following a deputation to Council in June by this forum I have asked that consideration is given to changing its name to better demonstrate that it includes all areas of our city and that it could be called "The City of Onkaparinga, Sports, Recreation and Surf Life Saving Clubs Forum", as the current name gives the impression that it is only representing southern clubs in the City. Although meetings are currently held at the Christies Beach Sports and Social Club, Christie Avenue, Christies Beach I encourage our sporting clubs to attend its meeting. I am hoping that it may be possible to have the Forum meet at different locations so that attendees achieve a broader understanding of each club's facilities. I will keep the community informed on the next meeting date. Geoff Eaton

LETTER TO EDITOR - INFORMATION ON 5G

As the rollout of the latest mobile phone network speeds up around the country, scientists have quashed rumours of health ill-effects linked to the technology.

Potential health effects from <u>5G technology</u> range from cancers to 'allergies', mostly based around radiofrequency electromagnetic energy, which is how mobile phones send and receive information.

It's a fear that doesn't hold weight, Dr Ken Karipidis from the Australian Radiation Protection and Nuclear Safety Agency told journalists on Tuesday.

Dr Karipidis said the initial radiowaves that would power the 5G network were the same that were currently being used by the 4G network. He said within three years, 5G would switch using millimetre waves, which is where a lot of the fear and concern was coming from.

"(Millimetre waves) don't travel very far, so because of that there's going to be a lot more base stations around and I think that's one of the reasons why a lot of people are worried," Dr Karipidis explained.

"There is going to be a lot of infrastructure that's near their house, for example."

Again, he said, millimetre waves are already used in technology that has been around for sometime, with no proven health effects in the long or short-term.

Dr Sarah Loughran said there was some misunderstanding around 5G technology: because it runs at a higher frequency, people assumed it also emitted higher energy levels.

While there will be more antennas and infrastructure needed to run the 5G network, it will run at a lower power level, and therefore its energy will not penetrate as deeply into the body as older technology, Dr Loughran said, who is at the Australian Centre for Electromagnetic Bioeffects Research out of the University of Wollongong.

Any energy penetration into a human body will only be skin deep, the two doctors said.

The brain tumour theory

As the use of mobile phones in society becomes commonplace, fears have grown around the link between speaking on a mobile – by holding it to one's ear – and the prevalence of brain tumours.

This fear has again arisen with 5G's advent.

Dr Karipidis was involved in an Australian study, published last year, that sought to compare any increase in brain tumour incidences over the past 30 years with the growing popularity of mobiles.

Dr Karipidis and his team found there was no increase in brain tumour rates during the period. He said there was also no link found in the long or short-term between radiowaves and cancer.

There are some people who believe they are sensitive to, or 'allergic', to electromagnetic energy, Dr Loughan said.


"This is actually a self-diagnosis ... with no medical or scientific evidence," she said.

And while there's no evidence yet to back up any concerns, scientists will continue to keep abreast of the technology and its potential impact on humans.

Monash University's Dr Gaizer Banke said the best way to recognise any changes after the rollout of 5G technology would be through before-and-after studies.

He said there would be a study in a few years time that will involve hundreds of people aimed at seeing if there have been physical changes after an increase in 5G exposure.

The network has begun to be switched on in test sites around the country, with a full roll-out complete sometime in 2020.



Rebekha Sharkie - re Telecomunications

Mayo has some of the highest risk bushfire zones in the nation and yet many of these areas have unreliable telecommunications and internet.

As we know Cherry Gardens is a district with steep terrain and thick bushland in parts which makes mobile phone and NBN wireless coverage problematic.

However, according to telecommunication companies, coverage is considered "adequate" and Cherry Gardens didn't make the 'cut' as a black spot when the Federal Government created its Mobile Black Spot Program database more than five years ago.

I believe this was a serious omission by Government and so I am working closely with Steve Murray MP, the State Member for Davenport, to see what we can do together to find a solution for coverage issues in the region.

After discussions with industry we have been advised an efficient and cost-effective solution to the district's problems could be achieved by installing 4GX infrastructure on the NBN tower recently built at the Blackwood Golf Course.

As always dollars need to be found so Steve Murray is seeking South Australian Government support for a regional digital connectivity project for Cherry Gardens. I am continuing my advocacy for a Federal contribution to the project and I am cautiously optimistic that we can secure a solution.

However, we do need the telecommunications industry to also come on board.

Mobile black spots and regional digital connectivity issues are important public safety issues for our community and require appropriate collaboration from industry and governments of all levels.

We will keep you posted on our advocacy and know this issue is front of mind, I'm sure with all of us working together we will make this happen.

Excitement is in the air among the teams, young and old, at Kangarilla Netball Club.

The 2019 season is underway, which means the resumption of fierce rivalries, nail-biting finishes and weekends spent with good friends. But there's also excitement about what's underfoot.

The council's \$1.2 million upgrade of the Kangarilla Recreation Ground has breathed new life into the clubs that use it, and into the community. The upgrade included a rebuild of four netball/tennis courts, which had fallen into a state of disrepair, the installation of sports lighting and a new perimeter fence. An access road, informal car parking, pedestrian paths and landscaping complete the project.

Kangarilla Netball Club president Jo James says the upgrade means a lot to the community. "Like many small country towns, sport has always been the backbone of the community, bringing people together," she says.



"Our community is also made up of other important groups including the CFS, school and progress associations, and the ability for them to all come together at one recreation facility is fantastic for the whole community and for our families.

"It's not unusual for a mum to drop her daughter at the hall for a dance class and her other daughter to netball and then a son to football at the same time!"

Jo says it's hoped the upgraded facilities will help attract new players to the various clubs that use the ground, which includes tennis, cricket and football.

"People are more likely to commit to a new club or sport when they can see there has been a significant investment put into it," she says.

"It gives them confidence that they're partof something that's valued.

"We've had players contact us to join our club this year and we know one of their reasons was the new courts."
