


CFS FIRE DANGER RATING SYSTEM



MODERATE

(replacing Low/Moderate): Plan and prepare

HIGH (replacing High/Very High): Be ready to act

CATASTROPHIC

EXTREME

(replacing Severe/Extreme): For your survival, Take action now to protect life and property

leave bushfire risk areas

Colour coding is as follows: Moderate - Green **High-yellow Extreme-Amber Catastrophic-Red**

Changes were made last year to the fire danger rating system which is worth reviewing as this bushfire season approaches. This system takes a national approach and sought to simplify the current different systems used in Australia, some of which were more than half a century old.

The updated fire danger rating will have four levels instead of six.

The system will use the current best science to inform the fire danger rating on any given day.

Signs across the country will be uniform.

This provides the community with clearer and more consistent messaging about the fire danger in their area on any given day and makes it easier for firefighters to understand how a fire might behave if one breaks out.

The Fire Danger Rating is an indicator of how dangerous a bushfire could be if it did occur. It is not a predictor of how likely a bushfire is to occur. It should be used as an early indicator to trigger your plans. The new system and signage are shown in the column on the left.

FIRE MANAGEMENT 2023/2024

The fire danger season in the Mount Lofty Ranges and Adelaide Metropolitan Fire District areas commenced on 14th November 2023 and will run until 30 April 2024.

A reminder to all residents that it is illegal (and dangerous) to let of fireworks anywhere in the Adelaide Hills. Only accredited businesses with the correct permits can purchase and let off fireworks and not during the fire danger season. The risk to livestock and animals as well as potentially starting a bushfire is high. You may be prosecuted.

During the fire danger season burning in the open (vegetation pile burning) is not permitted.


Since the start of spring, we have admitted 49 Bobtail Lizards after dog attacks.

These gentle, slow little reptiles - who are at the height of their breeding season - are being admitted with fractured skulls, jaws and ribs, spinal, ocular and internal injuries and serious puncture wounds penetrating right into their coeloms or body cavities. Of the 49, 23 had to be euthanised on compassionate grounds and 5 died on the treatment table while we were admitting them.

In one case, a healthy female was brought in for her own protection, not long after her badly bitten mate had arrived. She returned home alone.

The bobtail below is one of the 'luckier' ones. He came in with painful fractured ribs and multiple puncture wounds, but he has a reasonable chance of recovery and is finally starting to eat his food.





The survival rate for dog-attacked bobtails is only 40-50%. Many dog owners are distressed when they bring these injured animals in and we really appreciate their quick action and interest in adapting their backyards to protect wildlife, but we are also sad to see that some people regard these attacks as inevitable.

Please help us keep bobtails safe:

b please teach your dog to leave wildlife alone - regardless of its age

b reinforce good recall with clicks or treats

b use a leash when walking dogs near wildlife habitat

beep dogs out of national parks or risk a \$2000 fine

b use barriers, prickly dense natives and terracotta pipes in your yard, to provide safe areas for wildlife

be keep pet food inside to avoid tempting wildlife into contact with pets

b consider snake avoidance training to keep both your dog and reptiles safe (there is some anecdotal evidence that this can be an effective deterrent for bobtails, in some cases, although not all)

If you do find a bobtail lizard or for that matter any lizard that has been bitten by a dog or cat or injured in any way please bring it straight into care, (such as Minton Farm) so we can provide pain relief as soon as possible.

Thanksgiving.

Around this time of the year, there are a few events on the American calendar that we have become familiar with over the years. One of them is the American 'Thanksgiving'. On the 4th Thursday of November each year, Americans celebrate 'Thanksgiving'. Perhaps you have seen reference to this in US movies or TV series. On this important date for celebrating with family, they give thanks for the provision of the harvest, and for blessings received throughout the year. In its origins, this would have been a time to give thanks to God specifically for his provision. These days, no doubt many still do give their thanks to God, but many are thankful in a more general sense.

Harvest celebrations go back thousands of years. We read in the Bible that approx. 3,500 years ago the 'Feast of Tabernacles' was instituted, in which the Hebrew people were called to give thanks to God for his provision of the harvest, and for his provision in so many ways throughout the year.

In a novel I read recently, a teacher asked her class (of quite difficult students) to write a list of all the things they were grateful for. As she asked around the class, one student said, 'My list has got nothing in it!' ^[1] It's only a

novel, but how sad it is when we meet someone who has nothing that he/she is grateful for, who sees nothing to be thankful for! Gratitude does not come automatically: some people nurture it; some people seem to choose to suppress and destroy it. Thanks, involves:

- i. being grateful for something, as a thing received; and then,
- ii. ii. knowing to whom to be thankful, knowing the source of what one is grateful for.

If you were asked for a list of all the things, you're grateful for, hopefully you would not be like that student in the novel. We have much to give thanks for: family, friends; the creation in which we live, the fact that the sun rises every day; enriching life experiences including achievements in a profession, travel, sport, hobbies; people who have made our life better (past and present), times when we have been supported by friends, times when we have been able to support others; pleasant memories; challenges faced and met; and much more. THE ADVERTISER NEWSPAPER REPORT EDEN HILLS BLAZE

People setting off fireworks is suspected to have started a grass fire at Eden Hills on Thursday night, October 19th, 2023 that caused panic and nearby residents to be evacuated. Police are now investigating after emergency services including the CFS and Metropolitan Fire Service were called to Shepherds Hill Recreation Park about 11.20pm after reports of a grass fire. The cause of the fire is yet to be determined, however witnesses reported seeing fireworks being set off before the blaze started.

Fire crews managed to bring the fire under control quickly and saved nearby properties from being damaged. Residents from nearby Springwood Close were evacuated for their safety, and there were no reports of injuries. Crime Scene Investigators will attend the scene on Friday morning.

With bushfire season set to begin across most parts of the state, police are urging to be vigilant to the danger posed by bushfires, and report any suspicious activity in fire danger areas, to the police.

Cherry Gardens Garden Club 9th October, 2023

A really informative and practical presentation by Lynn Collins of the Fern society, on repotting ferns was our enjoyable topic this month.

She broached many of the myths and pitfalls when growing ferns, especially maidenhair ferns. The 'rules' are the bane of many peoples' lives. They need 75% shade against a wall with shelter from wind especially North winds. They prefer morning sun, free draining soil, with some Osmocote and mixed with bark, when repotting. She brought along a hare's foot fern to repot so that we could learn how to do it. Lynn brought a basket and a coir lining. They are actually epiphytes and need little soil and Bark mulch. Orchid bark is really good. Large bark is better than fine.

Their "Feet' should protrude and may "climb" over the edge of the basket. If there is too much dirt they can "suffocate".

Use liquid fish emulsion fertilizer half strength – Never, ever fertilize a fern on a hot day, or if the soil is dry. A little dishwashing liquid and water make a good soil wetter. Fertilize three times every summer. Ferns should never have wet feet. Sometimes they may completely lose their leaves, don't give up on them they will probably come back. For humidity put a plastic bag over the top of a dead looking plant. Never throw a fern away, they often come back. Some maiden hair ferns are endemic to Australia and New Zealand. Only go up one size when repotting. Use any fern potting soil for Hare's foot mulch. For Maiden hair add some mulch.

GEORGE'S GARDENING SUGGESTIONS for December 2023

Have you thought about a living Christmas tree? They can be a better alternative to artificial or cut trees as you can use them year after year and enjoy watching them grow. The only downside is that you will not be able to keep them inside for an extended period and when returning them outside they will need a shady spot for a few days. Woolly Bush is a favourite of mine but many in the Cypressus family or a Wollemi Pine would be suitable.

- Fruit trees need a good deep soaking on a regular basis to ensure they produce a good harvest. Protect your fruit with bird netting strung over some poly pipe and held down at the base with some bricks. The finer mesh is best as it is less of a problem with wildlife becoming entangled.
- Regular watering of tomatoes will go a long way to avoid blossom end rot, which makes the fruit unsightly. Sulphate of potash at planting will also help avoid the problem.
- Stressed plants are the ones usually vulnerable to attack from sap sucking pests such as mites and scale. Keep plants healthy but avoid over-fertilising.
- Continue planting sweetcorn, cucumber, beans and tomatoes as they cope well with the heat if they are planted into well prepared soil and mulched well.
- Keep your compost heap moist to speed up the breakdown of material and turn it regularly.
- Zinnias love the hot weather and provide a riot of colour.
- Petunias, phlox, and verbenas are favourites for summer planting.

OVER THE STABLE DOOR with Hamish



Greetings Fellow Equines and Horse Owners!

Getting into summer weather now, with some dry months ahead according to the forecasters. Hopefully fire plans are all in place by now.

The hay season began early this year and for a pleasant change, very minimal amounts of rain. It's always such a stressful time, this hay cutting business. Whether you have to buy hay in or grow your own, the timing of the cutting, raking, baling and shedding can make the difference between a successful year or the complete opposite. A reliable and knowledgeable hay man is essential, and as many may have discovered in recent years, these important people have become thin on the ground. If buying in, it certainly pays to shop around, chat to neighbours, friends and your local feed merchant. Word of mouth is often a good way to go (but not always!). There are many varieties of hay on the market too. Hay suitable for cows is probably not good for horses but can work the other way round. If dealing with a producer for the first time, see if it is possible to purchase a test bale. Hay which has been baled too early in the day may have some dampness inside the bale, so check that there is no heat or dampness. This can be potentially fatal for horses not to mention the risk of spontaneous combustion in the shed. Good hay should look clean, shiny (not dull or dusty) and should taste sweetly nutty. The bale should separate easily into batts and should be a good weight. If shedded in cool, dry conditions, most hay will keep for 3 years. The food value will be reduced, but if you are feeding 'fatties', then this is not necessarily a bad thing!

Surplus hay can be sold as suitable for cows, used as mulch or on slopey terrain as an erosion deterrent.

If your hay is still too 'good' for your horse, then putting it in a hay net and soaking for an hour or so will reduce the sugar content. Drain for another hour or so, then feed soon after. Don't delay, as the dampness can encourage bacteria to develop.

Another point to keep in mind is when introducing any new feed, to do so gradually over at least a week. Some horses can be quite fussy eaters and may take that long to become accustomed to a new hay. Horses have evolved to be very adaptable, but they need time to adapt.

Paying attention to horse habits, whether it is eating or behavioral is part of being a competent horse owner and guardian.

Although we can't speak 'human' we can let our owners know when we like or don't like something. So we rely on our owners to observe us and read our body language. Personally, I am a very easy going fellow, so I don't show much. My owners need to be very observant to discover if I am not happy.

Happy I am just now into my twenty first year! Safe eating and riding everyone!

FRIENDS OF SCOTT CREEK CONSERVATION PARK



On a perfect spring morning in October, we had a good sized group of Friends and locals meet for our annual spring wander in the park. We have called it a "wander"

to reflect its relatively slow pace, as we stop regularly to look at and discuss the wildflowers and wildlife, or some aspect regarding the interactions between them that has been noticed.

After heading up Bandicoot Track from Scott Creek Road, we wandered along Currawong Ridge Track up to Tom's Outlook for morning tea. People slowly headed back at their leisure, while others stayed a bit longer, taking in the views and taking photos of tiny plants and insects.

It has been mentioned several times recently, that since the January 2021 fire that swept through two thirds of the park, as volunteers we have found it very challenging to keep on top of the rapid and continuing growth of fire responsive weeds.

It would not have been possible to achieve the management of these weeds without the assistance of skilled bush care contractors, who undertake much of the work on larger infestations and in less accessible areas, thanks to funding received from a number of different sources.

In particular, I would like to acknowledge the funding we have received from National Parks and Wildlife Service through the Friends of Parks Inc., from Green Adelaide and from Landscapes Hills and Fleurieu. There have also been substantial donations that have been made to our group, to support our on-going work, both from before and since the fire.






