ANZAC Day

There will be an ANZAC Day service this year however at the time of writing we are unsure of what restrictions and guidelines may be in place. We are still not sure whether the RSL will be able to attend so at this stage we suggest that residents plan to hold the dawn vigil at the end of their driveways as we have done the last couple of years. If there is to be a community ANZAC Day service, we will let you know via our Facebook page and website.

Some late news on the Council plans to install lots of guard rails along Cherry Gardens Road to improve safety for motor vehicles.

Following the Zoom meeting we had with the council they have sent out letters to residents advising that they have listened to our concerns and will undertake road verge work as well as Tom Roberts Horse Trail to improve access and pedestrian/horse use. Some of the planned work includes pruning of trees. Reshaping the trail, removal of weeds such as blackberry, ivy and olives and improvement of the horse trail signage. This work will take place before work starts on the guard rail installation.

Louise was a compassionate person who visited our brigade after the fire to see how we were all dealing with the traumatic events. She was a friend to us.

We stood to mourn the loss of a mother and wife, and a family who has been ripped apart by this tragic incident. We stood in solidarity with Happy Valley CFS brigade, who received the news no brigade ever wants to receive, and who mourn a friend and family member.

We also recognise the loss felt by Eden Hills CFS brigade, with whom Louise was a member for many years, as well as another Brigade who was also impacted by this event.

The last two days of 2021 came as something of a shock when temperatures soared to around 40 degrees after a relatively mild summer although December was very dry with virtually no rain.

Lots of grass fires requiring water bomber attention have been reported on our pagers during December but these have mainly been in the Mid-North, Eyre Peninsula and the South-East so we haven't been called out.

The biggest of these was at Wrattonbully, near Coonawarra in the South East. On New Year's Eve, South Australian based aircraft did 68 drops – only four short of the 72 we loaded during the Cherry Gardens fire in January last year. The fire started in South Australia but quickly spread across the border into Victoria where, as at the morning of 2^{nd} January, it was reported as being still out of control.

Our ever watchful Admin Officer has reported the birth on 29 December of Emma – a magnificent Christmas present for the Ragless family. Congratulations from the Brigade.

January was also a quiet month for our Brigade although there were a number of fires down in the South East including the Coles Fire at Lucindale where tragically Louise Hincks lost her life.

We wish everyone a happy 2022. Stay safe and stay vigilant.

GEORGE'S GARDENING SUGGESTIONS FOR MARCH 2022



- Salvias, daylilies, and dahlias provide a great range of autumn colour and are very easy to grow.
- Prune spring flowering shrubs to promote new growth that will flower the following year.
- Remove dead flowers from lavenders and daisies.
- Remove dead flower stems from agapanthus.

- Prune box hedges on a regular basis, mulch and fertilise regularly.
- Prune roses lightly and fertilise for a good autumn display
- Purchase winter and spring flowering bulbs now, those native to cold areas such as tulip, crocus and hyacinth should be placed in a paper bag in the crisper of your fridge for a few weeks.
- Potted plants can dry out quickly in late summer, place the whole pot in a bucket to thoroughly wet ALL of the potting mix then apply a layer of mulch.
- While the soil is still warm it is a good time to plant citrus into a well-prepared raised site.
- Brassicas (broccoli, cabbage cauliflower, kale) will all enjoy a good start in warm soil at this time of year but keep the soil moist.

Greetings Fellow Equines and Horse Owners!

Into 2022 and let's hope this year is kinder to us in all ways.

Owning horses is not just a matter of 'owning' an animal. It is a unique relationship

because the human owner interacts not just on the ground but on top of that animal. As research broadens, scientists continue to discover more about how a horse learns, how to recognise signs of pain in facial expressions and how horses recognise the human. The horse actually knows way more about the human than the other way round. There are no secrets from them! Researchers have found that a horse is capable of recognising a scowling face from a smiling face. Not only that, they will prefer to associate with the smiling person than the one with a scowl. So if you happen to get impatient with your dearly beloved equine, hide your frustration with a smile if you hope to encourage a happy relationship the following day! Definitely something to think about!

During our break I have acquired yet another paddock mate. Although I say that loosely as she is a young mare. She and I get along ok, but the others are taking some time to 'warm' to her. She is 7 but green (although she is chestnut). So there is much for her to learn. First was the gradual process of introducing her to the rest of my mates. This took about a week, day by day, with no injuries or problems. Her feet were badly in need of attention and she didn't seem to know how to even pick them up! However, after a few days she was picking them quite happily. A fill in hoof trimmer was booked to do her feet and she became quite stressed (he did a good job). A couple of weeks later our regular trimmer came and again she became even more stressed. My mum hadn't had no problems with her at all, so the conclusion was that she may have had a negative experience with a male farrier. Fast forward a couple more weeks and my dad has been working with her and she is going well. The test will be when the regular trimmer returns. It will be interesting to see how this pans out. Fingers crossed. If my mum sees the slightest sign of tension in this green mare, then the trimming may be put on hold, at least with that particular trimmer. It is important that she stays comfortable and relaxed when having her feet done, so it will be done very carefully.

An interesting note here, is that whenever buying a horse, it always comes with a history. Owners will generally pass on what they want you to know and there may be a lot unsaid. My owners are pretty experienced and can cope with this situation, but it could easily unravel and not to the benefit of the horse.

As usual I am being my perfect self, maintaining weight (just) and behaving well. Looking forward to being able to get out and about! Keep safe if riding on the roads and acknowledge those motorists who slow down or give way.

Thalassa Ward Councillor Update February 2022

January has gone and here we are now in February but we still have the impact of COVID and need to ensure that we do our best to prevent it from spreading by getting vaccinated, having our boosters and complying with all the directions that are issued. We all have a responsibility to our family and community to act responsibly. When comparing the City of Onkaparinga's area with other metropolitan council areas by head of population we as a community have done very well in keeping community transmission down and getting vaccinated. So please continue to do the right thing to everyone.

Cherry Gardens Road, Cherry Gardens Road Safety Project

Following my last newsletter item relating to this Black Spot funding that the City of Onkaparinga has received and questions raised by some community members I arranged for a Zoom presentation by staff for the morning of Thursday 27 January to explain the process behind these types of programs, what was the reasons behind the safety measures and to answer any questions. Cr Themeliotis and I attended online. Don Watton and a number of other residents were able to participate and also raise any issues that that they had in regard to the proposed upgrade. Staff provided answers and also receive additional information and questions from those who participated. The reasoning for the safety measures and upgrade is as follows:

- 10 serious crashes over the 6.7 km stretch of road in 5 year period.
- 1 fatal crash.
- This equated to 0.3 serious crashes/km/year .
- 0.2 and above serious crashes identifies a road as a

Black Spot.

- Increase in local tourism traffic due to COVID.
- Safety systems approach to reduce serious injury.

The following options were considered as part of this project:

- Tree clearing environmental change and removal of endemic species, not in keeping with rural aesthetic of Cherry Gardens.
- Barrier kerb not MAS tested Department of Infrastructure and Transport (DIT) will not approve in areas where speeds are greater than 50 km/hr Stormwater management issues can be impacted.
- Further speed reduction DTI will not approve without a physical change to road environment.
- Other civil works 197 proactive and reactive maintenance works have been undertaken since 2004 –asphalt plane and reinstatement project.

Details of the timeframe for this project were provided as follows:

- Contractor engagement February 2022.
- Site inspection, hydro excavation March 2022.
- Material procurement March/April 2022.
- Construction April/May 2022 = subject to contactor and material availability..

Editor's note

Following concerns from a number of local residents on the scope of the proposed upgrades to Cherry Gardens Road the Cherry Gardens Community Association approached the council for additional information and this resulted in the Zoom call with council staff and our local councilors.

The Cherry Gardens Community Association is pleased with funding being available for improvements to Cherry Gardens Road however the concerns raised by locals warranted follow up with the council.

The primary concerns related to the broad use of new Guard Rails being installed along sections of Cherry Gardens Road where locals reported that there had never been any car accidents however several locations where there have been car accidents are not having Guard Rails installed. The logic behind this was questioned.

Also, there was a lot of concern around the impact these new Guard Rails would have on local residents and foot traffic, bicycles and horse riding. The lack of suitable footpaths and how residents would be able to manage once the Guard rails were installed was a concern to many. As many residents would be aware the Tom Roberts horse riding trail runs along Cherry Gardens Road, and we wanted a commitment that access to this Trail and maintenance of it would be ensured.

While the community understands the need to provide a safe road for motor vehicles, we also want to ensure that local residents are not disadvantaged and impacted by the installation of so many additional Guard rails.

We are expecting some feedback from the council to the suggestions and questions raised during the Zoom meeting.

Turning the Tide: The Future of Single-Use Plastic in South Australia

The State Government is seeking your feedback on single-use plastic products, and what single use plastic products should be considered for future intervention. Specifically, want to know how to address the impacts associated with single-use plastic products, which are largely intended for disposal after only one use.

They have identified a range of single-use products that can be made of alternatives that are reusable, recyclable, or compostable. You can learn more about these in the consultation paperfound on their website.

After becoming the first state in Australia to ban singleuse plastic bags in 2009, and prohibit single use plastic items like plastic straws and cutlery in March 2021, South Australia will be prohibiting polystyrene items like cups, bowls, plates and 'clamshell' containers and all oxo-degradable products from March 1, 2022. 

Mother's Healing Nature

Scott Creek Conservation Park, February 2021- July 2021.

After the Cherry Gardens bushfires ravaged the Scott Creek Conservation Park in late January 2021, the park was blocked off to the public. Then life began to regenerate. During the fires, 539ha of the 710ha park was burned, but not lost, as many believed.

While the impact of bushfires on Australian wildlife amounts to population decrease of native fauna, for many Australian plant species, fire can be a good thing.

Australian plants have adapted to bushfire conditions over time. Many species of gum rely on seed to regenerate and burning releases the seed from thick wooden pods, allowing it to spread. The deep layers of ash that remain become perfect seedbeds.

A lot of Australian shrubs, grasses, orchids, and ferns have lignotubers, woody organs at or below ground level that contain buds, the plants are able to reshoot from these buds, unaffected by the fire.

When fire burns through bushland it clears the undergrowth, allowing sunlight to reach the ground and regenerate, while remnants of burnt trees creating hollowed out logs provide new habitats for native animals. This recovery process takes time, but Mother Nature has incredible healing abilities.

Pedestrian access improvements

Thank you for attending the meeting held 17 January 2022 and providing your feedback on the project to install guard rail along Cherry Gardens Road.

Having listened to your concerns, it was clear that pedestrian access and safety is a priority when utilising this section of Cherry Gardens Road and we understand the importance of this and the impact it has on the community. We are committed to improving this section ensuring a safer environment for all road users and as such, I can advise that prior to the commencement of the road project, we will be undertaking additional works to ensure the road shoulders as well as the Tom Roberts Horse Trail are accessible for pedestrian use. In response to your feedback we will be undertaking the following works before the guard rail is constructed which is anticipated to occur by end of May 2022.

Works will include:

- A heavy prune of trees encroaching on the trail.
- Reshaping of the trail as required.
- Additional material to be placed at those areas where required.
- Removal of any trees that have grown in the trail (or alternatively re-routing the trail around existing trees clearly).
- Removal of weed species encroaching on or obstructing the trail such as:
 - blackberries
 - ivy
 - olives
- Cutting the grass.
- Removal of organic material such as grass clippings or leaf litter from the trail surface
- Improvements to trail signage:
 - signs located at more frequent intervals
 - trail signs to be raised to improve their visibility.

Once again, we appreciate your feedback and we anticipate the additional works detailed above will significantly improve the accessibility for all users of this section of Cherry Gardens Road.

Council will grow the tree in their nursery, plant it on your verge, provide informal health checks and prune it. Your role will be to water and care for your tree so it survives.



To date council field crews have planted more than 40,000 trees and each one of these will assist in providing shade, cooling, clean air, reduced stormwater runoff and habitat for our birds and wildlife.


